Those who run our Fair Trade stall form our social responsibility committee and organise our charitable giving play a vital role here.

May I suggest that as you each read through this report, you might, like me, take opportunity to reflect on your Christian journey. Where and how do you breathe in and breathe out? Are you doing rather more of one than the other? Are you giving yourself real, regular opportunity to learn and grow in faith, with others, and are you also able to find some new ways of living out the good news in our village, our country or the wider world?

The PCC agreed to make a donation toward "The Celebration of Life" held in June. It was most warmly received by many who attended. Speakers and music groups took part. Clergy and ministers from all village churches were involved every day for the whole week, and all the youngsters from Staplehurst School visited the marquee.

Items for discussion during the year:-

- a) Rising cost of Parish Magazine up to 90 pence per copy.
- b) Deanery Service held at Goudhurst church on 29th October.
- c) Proceeds from Harvest Supper donated to the Cathedral Project in Madagascar.
- d) Revd. Gill Calver became Area Dean for the Cranbrook Deanery in November.
- e) Members of the PCC met for an 'Awayday' in London. A Mission Statement has been produced arising out of the day.

Finances have been in the capable hands of Geoff Greetham, who unfortunately has had to resign owing to pressure of work. Patrick Harrisson has taken over as Treasurer.

We were all very sad to hear the news of the death of Mrs. Ivy Dykes, who was for many years a very staunch member of the church, and was as much loved and respected churchwarden for six years.

The church organ is in need of an overhaul. The Friends of All Saints have agreed to contribute towards the cost. Estimates are being sought.

We continue to use the Free Church Room for our meetings and thank members of the Free Church for allowing this facility.

Finally, a note of thanks from me to Karen, who has the unenviable task of deciphering my writing after meetings and typing them up in preparation for PCC meetings.

CHURCHWARDENS FABRIC REPORT 2006/2007

Firstly my thanks go to Alaine for her help and support during the past year as my fellow warden.

Boundary fencing was erected in the Churchyard extension. Bishop Graham consecrated the ground in March 2006, subsequently Wendy Green and her team have planted hedging along the fence, some 1500 plants. Warning/Safety signs have now been placed at all entrances to the churchyard to remind people of the potential hazard headstones can represent. Cecil Scarff has carried out sterling work renovating benches in the churchyard and agreed to weatherproof the main road wooden notice board.

The new kitchen and toilet is now finished and proving to be a real asset. We are still awaiting a full breakdown of costs for the final account. After a major trip hazard was identified by Kevin Fulcher, a new carpet has been fitted in the choir vestry. The interior notice board which was originally in the children's corner has now been relocated to the east of the Vickery window. It is nearly 20 years since the church organ had a major overhaul. With this in mind meetings have been held with Lesley Whitwood, the organists and organ specialists to decide what work is required to keep this instrument in good order. It is hoped that a decision will be made later this year. Lighting within the church is still a problem. A meeting has been held with the Diocesan Adviser on Church Lighting and various ideas have been suggested. It is hoped a solution will be found very soon. Plans are being finalised by our Architect for the re-ordering of St. George's Chapel and costs estimated.

To comply with the Disability and Discrimination Act, plans are to be prepared for the reordering of the Parish Room. This will include a disabled access toilet together with an access ramp from the pavement. These plans will also take into account updating the kitchen facilities using units and appliances kindly donated by Peter and Ann Brenchley.

Following advice from The Diocesan Advisory Council, a Type 1 Asbestos Survey was carried out on the church and parish room. Three samples were sent for testing, including the organ blower box. All came back negative. A Fire Risk Assessment has been carried out on the church building by Robin Oakley. A few minor issues have been identified which will be acted upon shortly. A similar assessment will be carried out on the parish room in due course.

Our inspecting Architect is currently investigating issues regarding the south facing roof of the south aisle. It appears from initial inspections that the original nails and battening of this section have now given way to the ravages of time. Quotations for this work are being sought.

Norman Wallis has carried out minor repairs to the tower roof flagpole tabernacle to address the problem of water entering the bell chamber. Fundraising for a new clock case has been led by Norman Wallis. The estimate for this job was approximately £1450 and fund raising has gone a significant way to raising this figure. The Friend's of All Saints have agreed to make good any shortfall in funds. A date is now being fixed for this work to be carried out.

I would like to thank the members of my Buildings and Grounds Committee for their support and work during the last year and all those who help in maintaining our church buildings in any way.

As this my last year as Warden, I would like to thank everyone that has supported me over the past four years. We have a great team of people here at All Saints with whom it has been an honour and a pleasure to work alongside and to socialise with. Although it is easy to get caught up in the day to day fabric maintenance issues, we must never forget that our church is much more than just the building. We must continue to work towards an inclusive ministry within our community and beyond, with a duty of care to make sure that everything we do happens in a safe environment.

I am indebted to Debbie, Daniel, Adam and the rest of my family who have supported me in all that I have been involved in, more often than not becoming very involved themselves. Very close friends including ex churchwardens have also been a terrific support.

At a PCC meeting with the Archdeacon last year we all agreed that a priority was to encourage children and young families to attend our Church and I am really pleased and confident that, with Marion Whitmore's appointment, our youth groups will grow. She has already set up Minisaints for the under 5s and re-started Explorers.

I would like to thank all who contribute in so many ways to the preparations required for services and to the daily upkeep of our Church. There are too many to mention by name but so much goes on "behind the scenes" to make everything run smoothly, thank you all.

As Andrew steps down as Churchwarden I would like to thank him for his help over the past two years and for his patience as I learned the ropes, and thanks, too, to Debbie and Daniel, always there with their support. In particular I thank Andrew for his work on the Buildings & Grounds committee - probably not a week goes by without something in Church needing looking at, repairing or changing. No longer will I be the "new" Churchwarden, I will now be expected to know everything (well that's what I expected of Andrew when I started!!). I'd also like to thank Mary, who stepped in to help while I was away in March; my husband, Brian, for his continued support and valued sympathetic ear; and most of all a big thank you to Gill, Phil and John for their ministry and inspiration to us all.

WORSHIP COMMITTEE

Our worship committee has continued to extend the variety of services held at All Saints during the year, as well as amending some of the existing services. Inevitably such ongoing change is greeted with enthusiasm by some and disappointment by others!

It has been particularly heartening to see our young people participating regularly in our family services, as well as leading their evening service. "Supersaints" and the "Cru" produced a challenging Harvest festival, their leaders weaving old and new wording and music, in a service intended for all ages.

Under the capable guidance of our newly appointed youth ministry co-ordinator, Marion Whatmore, we hope to continue to extend the youngsters' ministry as they lead our informal services. Our musical repertoire has always been broad and continues to broaden, thanks to the inspiration of our choir and director of music. It is good to have a praise band, fast growing, which extends our familiarity with some of today's worship songs, widely used in other churches. Their leader Gary Morley has been a useful member of our committee this year.

The Worship Committee have regularly reviewed our services, their timings, genre and attendance, as well as their wording. We also considered how our very small people can best be amused during services. Some new equipment was bought.

A new version of the Remembrance Day service was produced and generally received well. Especially appreciated was the lighting of a candle by two members of our uniformed organisations, in memory of those who lost their lives in war. Next year we shall make sure the wick has been prepared in advance!

Our committee were concerned that the "user friendly" cards for Book of Common Prayer services had not always been given out as regularly as had been hoped. It was felt these were a vital part of our ministry of hospitality to newcomers, who often struggle with finding the right pages in the prayer book.

A new service order for our Staplehurst "High Mass" has been produced and that service continues to attract a good number on the four times a year when it is celebrated.

Our varied programme of worship continues, thanks to the input of our enthusiastic team of lay and ordained ministers, musicians, readers, intercessors, servers and all those prepared to "come up to the front". We hope that our committee can carry on encouraging our church's belief in "collaborative ministry" in the years to come.

EDUCATION REPORT

The Sub-Committee has again looked at both adult and young people's education.

A Deanery Confirmation Service took place on 30th April 2006 at Frittenden. All Saints, Staplehurst had 15 candidates.

In the Autumn Gill ran a course entitled 'Collaborative People of God'. This was attended by 15 or so people who have the responsibility of coordinating different groups at church. It was aimed to give a deeper insight into good team working practices within a Christian context. This was a very useful course for those who attended.

A Film Group ran again this year during Advent and was very popular.

Three Lent courses were put on:- Phil led a quiet Hour, finishing with Compline at his house. John ran an afternoon Film Group and Gill lead the 'York Lent Course' on Thursday evenings. We felt that these were not very well attended, and will be looking at what people may like for 2008.

A baptismal meeting was held, when Gill, Phil and myself met with our existing baptismal visitors and people who were interested in becoming one of our visitors. We went over our current procedures and were delighted that Marion Whatmore, Margaret Thornton and Janet Osler agreed to join the team. We had over 40 baptisms this year and I would like to thank our team of visitors for all they do.

As well as our Good Friday and Epiphany 'All Age' workshops, which we held in church this year, All Saints also ran a workshop in June on the Surrenden Field, as part of the 'Celebration of Life' week. Much thanks goes to Thelma Manning and her sub-committee for all the work they do in organising these successful mornings.

Our young people's work has greatly benefited from the appointment of Marion Whatmore as Youth Ministry Co-ordinator. One of the things that Marion has managed to do is set up 'Minisaints'. A group for 0-5 year olds which meet in the Parish Rooms on a Thursday afternoon.

Marion and Sophie report elsewhere in detail on all the youth groups of the church.

Among other things, during the coming year Gill and John will be running a Bible study group; and a Parish Quiet Half-Day has been arranged for Saturday 30th June at Sandhurst Mission Church. *Karen Kember*

SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY REPORT

The main emphasis of this committee this year was the marking of the bicentenary of the abolition of the Slave Trade. Various activities were planned, culminating in the services and exhibitions during the weekend of 24th/25th March 2007. These included attending the Walk of Witness with our two Archbishops in London.

Christmas Ribbons of Remembrance were provided by Audrey Bullock. Lists of some of those persecuted for their faith were distributed so that Christmas Cards could be sent to them.

Pat Sherlock made a presentation to the PCC, explaining the work of the Pastoral Team.

Jo Green gave a talk on International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church about CWS's Free the Four Campaign.

We now have Christian Aid envelopes for recycling ink cartridges at the back of the church. Mary Shaw.

MUSIC REPORT

The most pleasing aspect of the music report this year has been the diversification of the music provision in church. As usual, the choir have given excellent service to a variety of different kinds of worship. It has been wonderful to have the participation of a number of occasional singers for big occasions like the nine lessons and carols, and the Archbishop's visit. We like to operate a system where singers can join in for the services or events that fit into their programme: this can be frustrating if you have 30 people to choir practice but only 12 to the service; or, conversely 12 people to choir practice and 20 to the service. It does mean that we never know how many people to buy music for or how the balance of voices will work; but it usually does. However we have been really proud of the sound the choir have produced this year and thrilled to welcome new members in both the young people's section and the experienced singers. The junior section now meet at 6.45 on Fridays and have some time together before the adults join in. Any other young (or older) members are always welcome.

We continue to be supported by our excellent band of organists and piano players: Ted Hall, Steve Bennett, Bob Chapman and Delphine Wass. We have had to use the CD accompaniment on very few occasions this past year and we are very grateful for their expertise and patience.

The diversification of the music has been achieved by the development of the group to accompany Praise services and Youth services under the leadership of Gary and the continuing support of Debbie. This has added a really welcome dimension to the musical life of the church and has meant that Lesley can take a back seat musically for at least two services a month; for which she is most grateful.

There are major events planned for the future such as the "Crucifixion" on Good Friday, "Messiah" in September and a musical production in 2008. There is always room for more – come and join us! Lesley Whitwood – Director of Music

YOUTH MINISTRY REPORT

I am very pleased to say that we now have Youth/Children's groups catering for those from 0 - 25 years old.

<u>Minisaints</u> - we launched in January and meet weekly during term time on Thursdays from 1.30 - 3pm in the Parish Rooms. This is a parent/grandparent/carer and toddler group for 0-5 year olds and over 50 different children have attended thus far. The weekly numbers vary (as does the weather!) but currently we have regular core of about 18. I am very grateful to the team of ladies who help with the registration and refreshments, especially Barbara Dear. Thanks too, to Ruth Humphries and Sarah Bond who help me to plan and lead the weekly stories, songs and craft activities that take place after a period of free play and refreshments.

<u>Supersaints</u> – many thanks to Sophie, Helen and Anne for leading this group and who report elsewhere on their activities this year.

<u>Explorers</u> – at the time of writing this report it is very much hoped that Explorers will have recommenced on 15^{th} March and then meet weekly in term time on Thursdays from 4.30 - 5.30 in the Parish Rooms. Many thanks go to Anna Silkin and Richard Barclay who have agreed to help me run this group for 8 - 11 year olds. The scheme will cover aspects of the Old and New Testaments, Saints and Church life, interspersed with 'fun' evenings and outings.

<u>The Cru</u> – Thanks to Sophie and John who continue to lead this group for 11–15 year olds. They had a fun year – the highlight was an ice skating trip where they managed to escape with only a few cuts and bruises! The 'Cru' particularly enjoyed being able to plan and lead the Pentecost service and look forward to having the opportunity to contribute to the church's worship life in this way again. The 'Cru' is always on the look out for new members.

<u>ASClub</u> – Because a large number of our 'older' young people left for university last year we have joined YPF and 18/30 and the members now call themselves ASC (All Saints Club). We meet on the second and fourth Sundays of the month at 7.30pm in the Parish Rooms. We select material to be included in the Youth Service, play games such as snooker and table tennis etc., have discussions or just sit and chat while drinking tea and coffee and eating penguins – (the chocolate variety of course!) Thanks to Gill and John for their support here.

Last winter the senior Youth Groups joined together and had a sleep over in the church. They built 'shelters' from cardboard boxes and Gill served warm food from the 'soup kitchen.' The exercise was to help us to be more aware of the homeless and although we were inside, it got very cold during the night and I think some found the floor rather hard. The young people were sponsored and we raised over £60 to send to the Children's Society.

At the end of August, and before the great exodus to university, quite a large gathering of young people, parents and clergy descended on Cheltenham Race Course for the 3 day event of Greenbelt. This included lots of different speakers, exhibitions and good music; all religious themes and something to suit everyone.

THE HEALTH, HEALING AND SUPPORT PRAYER GROUP REPORT

Ron and Barbara Dear are accredited to the Healing ministry and the Laying on of hands. The Laying on of Hands with prayer is now offered as part of regular worship at the Holy Communion service on the first Sunday evening of each month. Do come and use this service when you feel the need.

A leaflet, which outlines the work and aims of the group, is available in the Church Porch or from the writer.

We support, with our prayers, those who ask and those we know who are ill or having other difficulties with their lives. Over the past seven years we have supported and prayed for over 612 people and families, and know we have been of help. Some of the first people we prayed for are still on one or other of our Prayer lists, and continue to be supported in prayer on a daily basis by the individual group members.

Let us help you when you are in stress.

We now maintain three separate prayer lists. First, the official 'Church Prayer List' which is published as a part of Church Notices each week and is monitored by the writer. The second is the 'Confidential Prayer List', which is for anyone requiring prayer who, for any reason, does not wish to be on the church list. The third is the 'Support Prayer list' and is primarily for those who have problems other than desperate illness, for example those who are in cancer remission or have financial or other personal problems. Contents and details of all lists remain within the group, or to the individual members of the group when specifically requested, and not divulged or discussed outside. Confidentiality is strictly enforced.

Prayer for healing and support should be started as soon as possible, like going to the Doctor suspecting something before going for tests. We have been thanked by many for whom we have prayed and they, and we, are certain that God responds and hears our prayers. The earlier we can start the better.

Please ask me, or any member of the group, for help and Prayer when you, or someone you know, is in need. You will be surprised and thankful for the amount of help and comfort the Lord *provides to those who ask. Ron* Dear (891407)

May 2006

Bishop Stephen (who gave the Presidential Address for this meeting), invited members to dream with him about what the Church will look like in 2020! We had two choices he said, either to change only when we had to, or to accept change as an opportunity. There would be, perhaps, half the present number of paid clergy, but a wide variety of other ministries, lay and ordained, paid and unpaid, with different models to suit different places and circumstances. These were not plans, Bishop Stephen said, but ideas for discussion. Needless to say, the Synod took up the challenge.

Budgets and Pensions, always on the May agenda, were discussed, and were accepted by the meeting. Two Diocesan Missioners have been appointed for work in the Diocese, one will foster fresh expressions of church around the Diocese and the other will encourage inherited traditions models of church.

The Synod welcomed the new Director of Ministry and Training, the Revd. Rob Mackintosh.

November 2006

This meeting was devoted to discussing 'The Environment'. The intention will be to launch a move across the Diocese to take issues relating to environmental change seriously and theologically. It is hoped that a Diocesan policy will be agreed at the next meeting, and a response pack for use by members of Deaneries and Parishes will be produced.

Bishop Stephen announced the retirement of the Archdeacon of Canterbury, Ven. Patrick Evans. Synod goodbyes were said as this was his last Diocesan Synod.

Matters Arising
